DR. ANDREW CAMPBELL



LEADING WITH PRIDE

Often as leaders we have the opportunity to ask questions and gain the responses. We are in spaces where others are accountable to us. In this engagement I ask leaders seven questions that I use as my personal guide as I think about my leadership journey, invest in my growth, and work to ensure my impact and influence. This leadership conversation with queer leaders will draw attention to the continued learning, unlearning, resistance, empathy and love needed in our schools and

communities where 2SLGBTQIA+ members remain "invisible" due to a myriad of reasons.

Campbell (DR.ABC) is an Assistant Professor, Teaching Stream in Leadership for Racial Justice in Education, and the Teaching and Learning Coordinator for the Master of Teaching program in the Department of Curriculum, Teaching and Learning (CTL) at the University of Toronto – Ontario Institute for Studies in Education (OISE). DR.ABC is well known to the OISE community for his leadership on advancing anti-discrimination work in teacher education, and recently received OISE's 2022 award for Excellence in Initial Teacher Education.

Microaggressions in the Workplace

She loves teaching and is interested in how education workers can organize ourselves best to respond to the challenges of our times.

Creating and Implementing Diversity Policies and Advocacy

Jessy Dame is a very proud Two-Spirit, Métis, Certified Registered Nurse. Jessy's family is from Treaty 1 and 2 territory, which is known today as Winnipeg and St Rose-du-lac. Jessy has worked within Neonatal/Postnatal health. He currently works casually within a queer sexual health clinic in downtown Vancouver. Jessy is the Indigenous Sex and Gender Leader within the Indigenous Wellness team and the Two-Spirit Program Manager with the Community Based Research Centre. Through these roles Jessy is able to work with and for the Two-Spirit community to create resources and advocate for services.

CAMERON GRANT



Cameron strives to represent the interests of Northern Ontario. Passionate about the socio-economic landscape of the North, he keeps LGBTQIA+, climate change, Indigenous relations, renewable generation and the natural resource sector at the heart of his advocacy work. He is a founding member and Director for the Federation des gens d'affaires de l'Ontario, a public appointee to the Ontario Trillium Foundation, and a director for the Timmins and District Hospital. He was also instrumental in re-establishing the Independent Arts Council for Timmins. He previously sat on the Boards of the Public Affairs Association of Canada, and the Ontario Caucus Advisory

Council and as Provincial Co-chair for the Governor General's Canadian Leadership Conference. Engaged in the community, Cameron divides his time between the various non-profit organizations that seek to advance arts and culture in Timmins. He has been a long-time member of the Timmins Symphony Orchestra as a classical violinist and Director of the Board. He fulfils his love of winter sport, coaching the Timmins Ski Racers and as President and Chair of Mount Jamieson Resort.

TANNYS MOFFATT



Tannys (she/her) is an educator in the Winnipeg School Division and a member of the Manitoba Teachers' Society Teacher-Led Learning Team. Primarily a science teacher, she has been involved in planning and

implementing alternative programming for students needing additional academic, social-emotional, mental health and behavioural supports. She is a strong advocate for anyone who may feel marginalized by a binary and heteronormative society.

Christopher/C. Yendt (he/they) is a PhD Candidate in the Faculty of Education at UM as well as a certified teacher and student leader. They are passionate about exploring the experiences of queer student

leaders and challenging systems that continue to marginalize student voices. Their research focuses on reconceptualizing the notion of leader by (re) centering the student voice within discussions of leadership within post-secondary education spaces.

My name is Gwendelyn Freeheart and I'm a 19 year old non-binary person. I am passionate about movies, music, Guinea pigs, and advocating for queer rights!

MACKAYLA TAYLOR



Tansi! Nizho Misko Miigoganog nisithikason! Hello my spirit name is Two Red Feathers, and my name is Mackayla Taylor. I am a Two-Spirit Indigi-queer individual. After my second year of high school I took on

the role of caregiver to my grandfather, I am now first year University Student! I am currently doing the University 1 program, working towards a career in Social Work primarily action therapy. I actively advocate for rights within the LGBTQIA2S+ community, and have a passion to educate people on issues regarding Indigenous people.

While in my last years of high school, I mentored and worked alongside other Queer Indigenous youth, and helped them understand that their sexuality didn't define who they were as an individual. This was a highlight for me, especially because not only did I not have someone to turn to when my sexuality became a conversation starter. But because I was raised by people of the older generation who didn't accept or understand my sexuality until later in my life.

111 Stigma and Mental Health

Dr. Reitmeier completed his education at the University of Manitoba, and was a 2018 Distinguished Alumni Award Recipient. He is one of the only physicians in rural Manitoba who visibly and proudly provides consults for gender-affirming care, healthy sexuality, and harm reduction.

Robert C. Mizzi is the Canada Research Chair in Queer, Community and Diversity Education and Associate Professor in the Faculty of Education at the University of Manitoba, Canada. He has over 200 publications and presentations, including articles published in the Journal of Homosexuality and the International Journal of Educational Policy and Leadership. He has also published five books, with the most recent being the Handbook of Adult and Continuing Education in 2020.

Disrupting Racism/Anti-black Racism as Educators: Presence, Pedagogy, & Practice

"Advocacy often has no manual. It is more about being brave and standing between the vulnerable and power. It is a brave space. It is an exposed space." (DR.ABC, June 17, 2020).

Doing the work of advocacy and anti-racist work as educators within the system is challenging as you are situated closer to the issues and closer to the systems of oppression. You are part of the very system you wish to disrupt. This workshop will engage participants to examine the urgency with which change must happen within our schools and classrooms to disrupt and dismantle racism, hate, anti-Black racism, inequities, oppressive practices, and denials. We will examine the ways in which educators can do this work within their practice and pedagogy.
