Learning Assessment Strategies (Assessment as, for Learning)

Activate

- 1. The day before, ask students to bring an item that is important to them and represents a part of their identity.
- 2. Host a sharing circle where each student takes a turn sharing their item, explains its importance and how it represents their identity.

Acquire

- 1. Watch the video with Elliot Page at the Human Rights Campaign's Time to Thrive Conference.
- 2. Following the video, break students into groups of 4-6 students and have them discuss "If there has been a time in their life where they felt the need to hide a part of who they are." After enough time has passed and after the discussions have developed move 2-3 students (depending on group size) to a different group while the others remain where they are. In their new groups have them discuss "How could hiding a part of a person's identity hurt their sense of self-worth and/or mental health?" Following the same structure as before, have them move groups again and this time they are to discuss "Why people from the 2STLGBQIA+ community might find it necessary to hide their identity, and the affect it could have on their self-worth and mental health?"

Apply

- 1. In a journal entry have students answer the following questions:
 - a. Define what "Pride" means to you.
 - b. Explain why it is important to have pride in who you are.
 - c. What makes you proud of who you are?
 - d. How can you encourage others to be proud of who they are, regardless of their sexuality or gender identity?
- 2. After writing their responses have students share one or more of their responses in pairs, small groups, or as a whole class.
